#### Which One Fits You?

#### Post 9-11 GI Bill: Chapter 33

-Served on Active Duty after Sep. 10, 2001
-Served more than 90 aggregate active days
(including National Guard and Reserve Title X time)
-May be transferred to dependents as determined by DOD

#### Montgomery GI Bill: Chapter 30

-Entered Active Duty after June 30, 1985 -Served at least 2 consecutive years -Contributed \$1200 to the program

#### Reserve GI Bill: Chapter 1606

-No less than 6 year enlistment
-Participates in training (Unit Determined)

#### Marine Gunery Sargent John David Fry Scholarship

-Children with parents deceased in the line of duty after Sep. 10, 2011 may receive up to 36 months of educational benefits at the 100% level

#### Wartime Veteran Scholarship Fund

-Any Veteran living in New Mexico who has served in combat since 1990 and exhausted all other GI Educational Benefits

#### **Vocational Rehabilitation: Chapter 31**

-Service related disability of 20% or greater -Disability hampers current profession

### urvivors/ Dependents Educational Assistance: Chapter 35

 Child or spouse of completely disabled, missing, or deceased service member of service related circumstances

#### NM Vietnam Veteran's Scholarship

-Combat or in-country Veteran



#### **Peer Advisor Job Description**

The role of the Peer Advisor is to support the student veteran as they transition to campus life. Peer Advisors will be existing students who have experience and knowledge of the campus. The Peer Advisor will act within an agreed range of confidentiality and will ensure they have the best interest of the student veteran in mind at all times.

#### Roles and Responsibilities

- · Complete initial online training modules
- Coordinate times to call or meet with student veterans
- Provide informal support to student veterans to increase awareness of the resources available
- Refer student veterans to university, federal, and community resources as needed
- · Complete all interaction and outreach logs on a regular basis
- Increase campus awareness of the PAVE program and specific needs of student veterans

#### Qualifications

- Military service
- Good academic standing (2.00 or above GPA)
- Ability to work with others
- Good interpersonal, communication, and problem-solving skills
- Insight about transition challenges
- Can engage with and motivate people from diverse backgrounds

#### **Time Commitment**

- Attend initial training session(s)
- Attend optional group events and program recognition events
- Make a minimum of two-semester commitment
- Reach out to student veterans at least one time per month
- Participate in scheduled calls or meetings with other Peer Advisors to share successes and discuss any challenges

#### About the fellowship

The International Dissertation Research Fellowship (IDRF) program supports the next generation of scholars in the humanities and humanistic social sciences pursuing research that advances knowledge about non-US cultures or US Indigenous cultures and societies. The program is open to a range of methodologies, including research in archives and manuscript collections, fieldwork and surveys, and quantitative data collection. The IDRF program especially welcomes applications from underrepresented institutions.

#### Eligibility

The program is open to graduate students in the humanities and humanistic social sciences—regardless of citizenship—enrolled in PhD programs in the United States. Applicants must complete all PhD requirements except on-site research by the time the fellowship begins. Proposals for research conducted in the United States with US Indigenous peoples and on Native topics, and proposals that identify the United States as a case for comparative inquiry, are welcome; however, proposals that otherwise focus predominantly or exclusively on the United States are not eligible.

#### Fellowship terms

The IDRF program provides support for six to twelve months of dissertation research. Applicants from select humanities disciplines are eligible to apply for a shorter international component within the six to twelve months of support. Fellowship amounts vary depending on the research plan, with a per-fellowship average of \$23,000.

## OUR TEAM IS HERE TO SUPPORT YOU ANY WAY THAT WE CAN! READ OUR FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Why do I have GPSA charge on my bursar's account? Students enrolled in a degree-seeking graduate program at UNM are required to pay a student fee to GPSA. This fee goes to funding UNM programs and organizations and is allocated annually by the Student Fee Review Board. Students who do not pay this fee are not eligible to apply for scholarships or grants through GPSA.

Are new UNM Graduate & Professional Students eligible to apply for grants? Yes. You are eligible to apply for SRG, PDG and NMRG (if being offered in the semester) if you meet the respective grant's requirement. However, you are not eligible to apply for the Graduate Scholarship Fund (GSF) if you are in your first semester.

**Are grants and scholarships offered every semester?** The Student Research Grant (SRG), Professional Development Grant (PDG) and Graduate Scholarship Fund (GSF) are offered in every semester i.e. Fall, Spring and Summer. However, the New Mexico Research Grant (NMRG High Priority and General Priority) are offered only in the Fall Semester.

**Can I apply to multiple grants in one grant cycle?** Yes, you can apply multiple grants in the same grant cycle, but each grant requires a separate application i.e. Statement of Proposal, Budget sheet and Letter of Recommendation (if required).

Can I utilize my grant award another semester? Yes, you can. The funds which are sought for the event or activity must be utilized within the next, current or previous funding period.
