#### WHAT IS HSSC?

#### **HEALTH SCIENCES STUDENT COUNCIL (HSSC)**

The HSSC has three main functions. The first is to promote interprofessional education and collaboration. The HSSC also acts as a liaison between the students and the HSC administration. 

## Mapping Brain Development in Childhood

#### **Institute for Human Neuroscience**

Researchers at The Mind Research Network are looking for healthy children to participate in a noninvasive brain imaging research study of brain and cognitive development.

#### Why are we doing this?

The purpose of this study is to understand how the healthy brain matures and how hormones influence this development. As children mature into adolescents and eventually adults, both their brains and cognitive abilities change dramatically. This study aims to identify those changes. To study the brain, we will be using a series of brain imaging tests, all of which are non-invasive and harmless.

#### What will be required?

- Complete two visits each year for 5 years
- Complete MEG and MRI scans
- Complete neuropsychological and cognitive assessments
- Provide saliva samples

There is no cost to you, and you will receive compensation for your time.

Each participant will receive \$50 in cash at the end of each visit.




#### Children who are eligible:

This year, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will hold the 9th Affordable Housing Student Design and Planning Competition, which will be awarded late spring 2022. 

#### About the fellowship

The International Dissertation Research Fellowship (IDRF) program supports the next generation of scholars in the humanities and humanistic social sciences pursuing research that advances knowledge about non-US cultures or US Indigenous cultures and societies. The program is open to a range of methodologies, including research in archives and manuscript collections, fieldwork and surveys, and quantitative data collection. The IDRF program especially welcomes applications from underrepresented institutions.

#### Eligibility

The program is open to graduate students in the humanities and humanistic social sciences—regardless of citizenship—enrolled in PhD programs in the United States. Applicants must complete all PhD requirements except on-site research by the time the fellowship begins. Proposals for research conducted in the United States with US Indigenous peoples and on Native topics, and proposals that identify the United States as a case for comparative inquiry, are welcome; however, proposals that otherwise focus predominantly or exclusively on the United States are not eligible.

#### Fellowship terms

The IDRF program provides support for six to twelve months of dissertation research. Applicants from select humanities disciplines are eligible to apply for a shorter international component within the six to twelve months of support. Fellowship amounts vary depending on the research plan, with a per-fellowship average of \$23,000.



### OUR TEAM IS HERE TO SUPPORT YOU ANY WAY THAT WE CAN! READ OUR FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Why do I have GPSA charge on my bursar's account? Students enrolled in a degree-seeking graduate program at UNM are required to pay a student fee to GPSA. This fee goes to funding UNM programs and organizations and is allocated annually by the Student Fee Review Board. Students who do not pay this fee are not eligible to apply for scholarships or grants through GPSA.

Are new UNM Graduate & Professional Students eligible to apply for grants? Yes. You are eligible to apply for SRG, PDG and NMRG (if being offered in the semester) if you meet the respective grant's requirement. However, you are not eligible to apply for the Graduate Scholarship Fund (GSF) if you are in your first semester.

## WANT TO LEARN MORE ABOUT GPSA?

Are grants and scholarships offered every semester? The Student Research Grant (SRG), Professional Development Grant (PDG) and Graduate Scholarship Fund (GSF) are offered in every semester i.e. Fall, Spring and Summer. However, the New Mexico Research Grant (NMRG High Priority and General Priority) are offered only in the Fall Semester.

**Can I apply to multiple grants in one grant cycle?** Yes, you can apply multiple grants in the same grant cycle, but each grant requires a separate application i.e. Statement of Proposal, Budget sheet and Letter of Recommendation (if required).

**Can I utilize my grant award another semester?** Yes, you can. The funds which are sought for the event or activity must be utilized within the next, current or previous funding period.
