Critical Race Series featuring Dr. Vinay Harpalani




Thursday, September 22nd, 2022 5pm-7pm AAPIRC, Education Classrooms #212

UNDER ARTICLE 12, SECTION 13 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION, ONE MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO SHALL BE A MEMBER OF THE STUDENT BODY (STUDENT REGENT). THE STUDENT REGENT IS ONE OF SEVEN FULL VOTING MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS AND HAS THE SAME RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES AS OTHER BOARD MEMBERS, ALTHOUGH STUDENT REGENTS SERVE TWO-YEAR TERMS WHILE OTHER BOARD MEMBERS ARE APPOINTED TO STAGGERED SIX-YEAR TERMS.

AS DEFINED BY THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES, THE BOARD OF REGENTS IS CHARGED WITH THE MANAGEMENT AND CONTROL OF THE STATE'S FLAGSHIP RESEARCH UNIVERSITY. THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO IS THE OFFICIAL NAME OF THE UNIVERSITY AND THE REGENTS CONSTITUTE A BODY CORPORATE. AS SUCH, ALL MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS ASSUME OVERALL RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE UNIVERSITY AND ITS AFFILIATED RESEARCH PARK CORPORATIONS. THE REGENTS CAN ACT ONLY AS A WHOLE, NOT INDIVIDUALLY. THE BOARD OF REGENTS HAS DELEGATED SOME OF ITS POWERS TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY. THE BOARD OF REGENTS IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE SELECTION AND SUPERVISION OF THE PRESIDENT AND PROVIDES THE PRESIDENT WITH STRATEGIC DIRECTION.
